



The Los Gatos Creek Urban Stream Restoration Project, 1993-96





Urban Stream Restoration Project - Epilogue

- Changed the State's environmental policy by setting a Statewide precedence for "Advanced Mitigation"
- Energized and involved an entire Community; made everyone more aware of the Los Gatos Creek and riparian ("streamside") habitat
- Inspired the Santa Clara Valley Water District (SCVWD) to update its Charter to include "Land Stewardship" in addition to "flood control" and "water supply"





Trail's History

- 1920's: Western Pacific built the spur rail line from Niles across San José to service the canneries in Willow Glen
- 2000: San José Park Strategic Plan,
 "the Greenprint", identifies rail POW as trail corridor if/ when rail service is abandoned
- 2001: Rail service discontinued;
 SJ did not exercise "right to buy";
 Union Pacific offers ROW for sale
- 2002: community presses for trail;
 Councilmember Yeager & Council add trail to General Plan and begin pursuit of purchase
- 2007: SJ has not purchased ROW; some parcels sold for housing or industrial uses; community presses again for trail; SJ sets up "WG Spur Trail Focus Group"
- 2008/09: "Citizens for a Livable San José" and "Save Our Trails" work for Trail; Guadalupe River P&G establishes Conservancy
- 2010: Three Creeks Trail added by Envision 2040 to General Plan Update









> Historic value of train trestle deserves City Council respect

For many years, community advocates have worked with the city of San Jose and its parks deoff-street bike paths such as the Los Gatos Creek and the Three Creeks Trails. The plan was always to connect these two trails using the historic railroad trestle in Willow Glen - a sturdy cityowned 93-year-old wood-timber bridge over Los Gatos Creek.

Last year, the city abruptly decided it would instead demolish and replace the classic trestle with a more costly prefabricated

Analyze the feasibility of rehabilitation, considering among other things the engineering report the city commissioned that shows that restoration and adaptation of the trestle for trail use is safe, environmentally responsible, straightforward and cost-effective.

and the EIR's analyses. Hopefully, the city's decisionmakers will listen and understand the importance of preserving vital local history.

Importantly, if the EIR finds the trestle to be historic and that its reuse is feasible, the city cannot approve demolition.

And, while the focus of the lawsuit was the trestle, the ruling affects far more than just this one bridge. The Superior Court ruled that the city cannot unilaterally declare a threat-

When presented with credible evidence of historic qualities, an EIR is mandated to analyze a structure's historic authenticity its demolition.

Better speak up fast on Three Creeks bridge

When last we took up the cause of the old wooden trestle that crosses Los Gatos Creek on what's now the Three Creeks Trail, it was clear that San Jose's outreach on the demolition plan had been — oh, let's just say it: rigged. City staff members had discussed it in public or semi-public settings without civic activists realizing that ripping out the structurally sound trestle was a done deal. Advocates made a heroic attempt to salvage it in the spring, but it was too late. Mayor Chuck Reed and the City Council rules committee refused to reconsider demolition.

The project continues at record speed, and Wednesday night is your second-to-last chance to the historic trestle. At a Willow Glen Neighborhood Association meeting, an architect and city staff will to Save our Trails earlier this month. Both those





- Trestle is sturdy and can readily be restored and adapted for trail use
- Doesn't impede creek flow or create flooding hazard
- Contamination: best if pilings left undisturbed and in place






Seth Bergstein: Willow Glen Trestle History

Not a spur on Oakland route, but the Main \$J line!




WP RR thru Willow Glen & to the San Jose Depot







at-grade on 4th St




1927 Map at City Hall

- WP arrives in SJ
- Belt-line J-hook loops around SJ, avoiding residential areas
- Breaks SP's monopoly



Alternative SP Alignments

- City of San José traded SP off against WP and Willow Glen in the future around-town alignment.
- Willow Glen fought for gradeseparation at major arterials; SP realigned their route to avoid crossings w/in WG town limits; WG fought for separations anyhow, denying SP the franchise unless they complied. (Issue went to courts, and up to Supreme Court.)


